- Additional materials will not be accepted or used in support of the nomination.
- All nominations will be reviewed and judged by a panel of community representatives according to the criteria requested on the nomination form.
- Nominations can be made at any time during the year and will remain in the running for consideration throughout the award time period.

### Selection Criteria

- Nominee consistently performs above and beyond their job description/requirements to serve the children and families of Pinellas County.
- Nominee is an inspiration to co-workers and clients.
- Nominee's efforts have helped improve the condition of a group or individual.
- Nominee is an employee in good standing of an employer with a Pinellas County program.
- The nominee's primary duties are to provide direct services to children and/or families - NOT a supervisor, manager, director, or executive director.
- Classroom teachers above the pre-kindergarten level are NOT eligible. However, other public or private school employees, such as social workers and guidance counselors, are eligible.
- The nominee may not be an employee or family member of the Juvenile Welfare Board administration or executive leadership.
